# **CLIMATE**

Namibia has a subtropical arid climate, but with some surprises! The scorching heat of the desert can easily give way to very cold nights and mornings. The temperatures along the central watershed average a pleasant 82° Fahrenheit during the dry or winter period from April to September. Summer temperatures can reach 102° Fahrenheit and high humidity is often experienced in the north.

## **CURRENCY & CREDIT CARDS**

The currency in Namibia is the Namibian Dollar (NAD) which is fixed to, and therefore equivalent to, the South African Rand (ZAR). Namibian banks charge a commission for changing foreign currency. Bureau de Change usually do not charge a commission. The Namibia Post Offices (NamPost) also have change bureaus in the major towns. There is a Bureau de Change at Windhoek International Airport and most major towns in Namibia have at least one Bureau de Change.

MasterCard and Visa (both with raised credit card numbers so that an imprint may be taken) are generally accepted throughout Namibia. Clarify with a commercial bank whether other credit cards are acceptable in Namibia and check for any fees you may be charged. American Express and Diners Club specifically are no longer accepted in Namibia. Cash should be kept in small quantities for purchases of crafts or in smaller shops. Note: If carrying cash, it is recommended that you take only recently minted U.S. currency.

#### SHOPPING HOURS

Normal shop hours are from 9:00am to 5:00pm, Monday to Friday, and Saturdays 9:00am to 1:00pm.

# **LANGUAGE**

English is the official national language. Afrikaans is the conversational language and German is also widely spoken. There are many local languages and dialects.

### **VOLTAGE**
